As part of the leadership team of the Franciscan Brothers of Brooklyn, one of my duties is to each year attend the St. Francis Day celebrations at one of our high schools. This year I was asked to give the reflection at the end of Mass at St. Francis Prep - a large, multi-cultural school in Queens. I am sharing excerpts with you because sometimes, sharing thoughts with future generations can also clarify them for us.

Peace and good to you all.

We sometimes look at Francis as a naïve, clueless saint who lived in a fairy tale world of castles and kings. We picture him as living in a society of noble princes and high-minded Church leaders. But the reality is that he lived in a violent society where war was a frequent visitor to his town. Although it was a time of faith and the blossoming of great learning and discovery, Francis did not live in an idyllic situation.

He lived in a society where one was taught from a young age to label members of your world as friend or enemy, based on your class in society, your religion or the town you

lived in; where religious figures were also political and military leaders who would lead armies to slay the enemies of the faith.

Yet somehow through God's grace, he was able to see through all that to the beauty of life and the joy that creation and his brothers and sisters gave. God put him on earth at that time, in that place, to affect his society.

He did that by concentrating on the beauty of each individual person: by speaking to the leper with the same love and respect as he spoke to the pope; by understanding that the Sultan if Egypt was just as much a child of God as he was.

He called himself God's fool, because he was tasked to preach the Gospel to a world that seemingly deaf to hearing it. And he called himself and his followers Brothers, not as a title of respect or honor, but as a sign of relationship.

And so here we are, 800 years later, in a violent, self-centered society, hopelessly divided, yet at a time of unparalleled advancement in medicine, technology, self-awareness, etc.

Let me pose you a question:

What is your role as a Franciscan student, as a Franciscan educator – in the 21 Century? Make no mistake, God has placed you here, now, just as he placed Francis in the 12th Century. You are here for a reason – with your talents (discovered or yet undiscovered), your idiosyncrasies, and your failings.

Someone once gave me a button. It said "Jesus is coming – look busy." We don't have. To look busy – we have to BE busy.

Some of you may be future world leaders. Most of you will be leaders in your own microworlds. It may look like the world is such a mess, with so many problems, that to attempt anything seems overwhelming.

I would like to offer three suggestions to help you live your Franciscan life:

First, love the person who God puts in front of you.

Francis encountered the leper. Each day, God will block your path with a gift. Gifts come in all sorts of wrapping – some may not look as pleasing as others. The person that God puts in front of you may fill you with joy, rage, disgust. Find the good, because God only

creates good.

Understand that truth is truth

You know the story of Francis and the Sultan. Both came from different cultures, they both had different names for God. Yet they both wanted peace. Although in the end they agreed to disagree, they didn't allow the labels of society to get in the way of mutual respect and dignity. In your hearts, you all know what is right and what is wrong. You were taught by loving parents, and entrusted by them to others who taught you ethics and morals, no matter what your religious flavor.

Live your reality

God has created us in many varieties: male and female, straight and gay, conservative and liberal, and on and on. God created you as you are to use your uniqueness as a gift for this world. Be God's fool just as Francis was, and encourage those who need it to be themselves.

Make mistakes. Look to the older people in your lives to be mentors. Let them teach you how to grow, how to forgive yourselves, brush yourselves off and move on. Most of all, be patient and know that God is doing a great work in you.

It is fall! There are football and pumpkins. In the Midwest we have cooler temps, beautiful trees and the hope of post season baseball. And for Franciscans everywhere, there is the feast of St. Francis. A Midwestern Franciscan should be a happy camper these days. But there is still sadness and disappointment in the church we love and for the hurting faithful we love. These are not easy days for any of us.

A fellow Franciscan reminded me the other day that this is a time to be like Francis—a bridge between the church and the people of God. Bridging is not an easy task and one that tests our strength, our creativity and need I say, our faith.

I began musing about difference types of bridges. There is the draw bridge that sometimes goes up. It separates the two sides when it goes up and gives each side a little rest and break from the other. Sometimes that rest is sorely needed as something passes between and changes the focus for a bit. Distractions can be their own gift is times of stress.

A suspended rope bridge can be fun and challenging at the same time. It seems to be influenced from both sides and all the winds from every side in between. Flexibility and

movement are its gifts. Steps gingerly taken invite reaction and progress. Sometimes it is the only way to cross a big chasm.

Fall is the season of covered bridges framed in fall colors. It is a bridge that offers a cozy, safe spot in the middle away from the elements of heat and cold, rain and ice. A moment in the journey where one can relax with no pressure is welcomed when one is bridging. They are often one way bridges and offer a time to be alone and maybe regroup a bit before heading on down the road. Sometimes they take us over troubled waters that we can't even see.

All these images offer us ways to be with church and the people of God these days. But my concluding thought is that a long suspension bridge is not needed because the distance between the church and the people of God is very short.

Make me like Francis, an instrument of peace and a bridge of healing.

COMMISSION OF CHARISM SERVICES

The Franciscan Way of Life

The month of October is naturally focused on Brother Francis with his feast day on the 4th. Many congregations commemorate the Transitus and others have the traditional blessing of the animals. And it is quite right that October becomes a focal point for such activities. I often wonder about the rest of the year and how we integrate this Franciscan spirit, the charism given to us, into the details of our everyday lives. How do we invite others - "widen our tent" - to experience this gift we so cherish and celebrate?

About seven years ago, my community, the Dubuque Franciscans, established a Charism Team as a new way of looking at what has traditionally been called "vocation work." The question for us was not how many women can we recruit, but more importantly, how can we share the Franciscan charism with others, whether they become vowed members or not. One of the ideas that surfaced on this journey and has become a treasure, is a two-year process we call the Franciscan Way of Life. Small groups interested in learning more about Franciscan values and spirituality meet monthly, in person or via technology. These groups have been comprised of sisters, laity, priests, and staff of sponsored ministries. Each session addresses through prayer, reflection and discussion, a pertinent Franciscan topic. About mid-point each year, participants are invited to an immersion/service experience to step out of their comfort zone and walk in someone else's shoes. At the end of the two years there is a discernment process as to their next steps: to become an Associate, pursue their interest in vowed life or continue to integrate the Franciscan values in their daily lives where they are. Some groups decide to continue to meet past the two years, as the community created and the shared reflection are so important to them. But don't take my word for it. Hear from some participants in their own words:

Carol Lyon: I have been drawn to the teachings of Saint Francis of Assisi for quite a while, so when my friend, Kathy, invited me to participate with her in an online Franciscan Way of Life program, I thought it would be a great opportunity to learn more about Franciscan spirituality...This program supports my spiritual growth and challenges me to examine the way I'm living my life.

Gretchen Brown, CEO Stonehill Franciscan Services: The information that has

been presented has influenced me in many ways. As I listen to the history and teachings of St. Francis, I think about my role in building a culture where all team members of Stonehill Franciscan Services demonstrate the Franciscan Way in their daily work and interactions...I am very aware that I am in a position of influence. The content of these classes has reinforced that I must do a self-evaluation every day to be sure I am leading by example in the spirit of St. Francis. To those I serve, I must show my intense love of God and desire to be like Jesus. I will show respect for all persons, especially the poor. I will demonstrate a deep reverence for all creation and my commitment to peacemaking. I will do everything I can to create a wonderful community at Stonehill Franciscan Services. These will serve as my guiding principles.

Fran Mancl: At birth, I was gifted by my parents with the name, *Francis*. Since my mother deeply admired St. Francis of Assisi, she thought it was the perfect name for her 2nd born son. As I grew up I learned about St. Francis of Assisi but only recently did I take to heart the depth of this man's love for the Lord. I completed the Franciscan Way of Life program, and following a time of prayerful discernment, felt called by the Lord to become a Franciscan Associate. One of the qualities about St. Francis that I always admired and finally had the time to explore was his spirituality. I have learned, and continue to learn as a Franciscan Associate, that my inner transformation into a man of God, like that of St. Francis, begins with prayer... Prayer takes me beyond trust in me alone. It's not about me but it's God within me who is revealed to others around me, and definitely revealed in my ministry to the elderly I service with love and care as a CNA.

Carole Grubb: How can I capture the power of a two-year experience, the Franciscan Way of Life? I can't, but I can try to live it out because its impact has been life-changing...The FWL experience gave me people - Francis, Clare, those leading and those in the group - who showed me what surrender looked like and what service meant. My service experience has led me to seek ongoing opportunities to help others realize more of Christ in their own lives. It's a whole different way of seeing and being. I thought I could coast in my older age, but now I'm just getting started in a far deeper walk – A Franciscan Way of Life that does not end, but leads Home.

And so, the question these testimonies pose to each of us is: How do I live and share the Franciscan Charism in this time and place?

YOUR VOTE COUNTS

Most of us in the Franciscan Federation, hopefully all of us, know the importance of voting in national, state and local elections. The Vote should be a significant equalizer in this country that tolerates economic and social inequality. Voting is an opportunity and responsibility that comes with citizenship. Because some with economic and legislative power know how important the vote is, they devise ways to keep people from voting, especially people of color and people who are poor. Clearly this is contrary to who and what we say we are as United States citizens.

Unfortunately, many who take their vote seriously in presidential elections take a break in mid-year elections. If ever a mid-year election manifested its importance it is this year, in November, 2018. Many seats in both parties and both House and Senate are at stake. We experience deep divisions and lack of leadership in House and Senate on issues of justice we care about, leaving the way open for executive orders that are anti-immigrant, anti-refugee, anti-environment, and anti-anti-gun violence prevention. Congress did act on tax cut legislation which benefits only the wealthy and currently proposes even more tax cuts. This mid-term election offers a possibility for change, but only if all of us vote.

Ten Catholic organizations based in DC created a reflection guide: "A Call to Holiness: A

2018 Guide for Voters," which offers reflections on several issues at stake in this election and suggests questions that can be asked of candidates for office of both parties. The guide is poste on FAN's website and can be shared with others in families, communities and parishes. Please remind everyone that YOUR VOTE COUNTS.
