Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As I pondered what I should write about for this issue of Musings I looked back at three significant events – two of them I participated in and one that I heard about from others. These events were the Franciscan Federation Annual Conference, LCWR Assembly and the one I did not attend was the Pando Populus event held in Maryknoll Monrovia, CA. For me these three events had similar themes that the world needs to embrace. What connected these events?

Just that – interconnectedness with God, our brothers and sisters, and all creation.

The theme of the AFC was "Franciscans and Muslims: Lessons from the Past and Prospects for the Future. The keynote presentations of Kathy Warren, OSF and Michael

Calabria, OFM gave us history, culture, writings and pictures that brought the encounter of Francis and Malekal Kamil to life. For Francis everything was about relationships. We were challenged to also be in relationship with our brother and sister Muslims, immigrants, refugees, people who are in the margins, and others who may need to be connected with or in relation to someone.

"Being the Presence of Love: The Power of Communion" was the theme of the LCWR assembly. Throughout the assembly words like encounter, relationships, connectedness permeated the presentations and conversations. We need to bring love and communion to our fragmented world.

For me all the LCWR speakers sounded like Franciscans! They spoke about God, the Trinity as "pure reciprocal relationship" and "The Trinity needs Creation-Incarnation in order to reveal itself." One of my favorite lines is "As the Father self-empties in the Son and likewise in the world, our divine vocation is also to empty ourselves, in a reciprocity that is universal, interpersonal, intercultural, inter-gender, and inter-cosmic." (Quotes from Br. Simon Pedro Arnold, OSB presentation.)

The third event is one that I did not attend but heard about it from my sister, Joyce Shanabarger. She was invited to attend the "Pando Populus and Women Religious Event." From what I heard and from what I have read this is truly something we Franciscans need to be following. It is all about connecting people and inspiring them to look at possibilities and come together to make a better world.

I was intrigued about the name Pando Populous so here's a few things I learned from the internet about this movement. Pando in Latin means "I spread". It is the name of an aspen tree that produced a whole forest from one tree. All are connected by their root system. Essentially it is a "one-tree forest." This 106-acre forest in Utah is the largest known living organism in the world. Scientists are now concerned about the slowing of the regeneration of this forest.

Populus comes from the Latin meaning "people." That's where we come in. Looking at our world we see so many divisions and relationships falling apart. We see gaps between the rich and poor and belief and unbelief in global warming and climate change. I believe that if St. Francis were living today he would be right in the middle of the conversations of the pando movement. Pope Francis already is with his encyclical letter Laudate Si when he writes about "integral ecology." This movement is about connecting people and inspiring them to help create a better world.

We as Franciscans need to be part of conversations that involve building relationships and being connected especially when it comes to all of God's creation.

How do we describe the moral climate in our Church and our country at this time?

The sex abuse scandal, each time its details flare before us, reminds us of our human potential to sin: perpetrators exist and act; some just look the other way as if they do not see either the perpetrators or the victims. Such a time also reminds us of our capacity to care: some demand responsibility, retribution, justice; some wish to love all, perpetrators, victims, and even the silent, with both tough and tender love. How can we respond to this 'real news,' with the Good News?

I look to the Saint Francis' Letter to a Minister to find ways to temper my morale in this climate.

¹To Brother N., minister: May the Lord bless you. Nm 6:24 b

²I speak to you, as best I can, about the state of your soul. You must consider as grace all that impedes you from loving the Lord God and whoever has become an impediment to you, whether brothers or others, even if they lay hands on you. ³And may you want it to be this way and not otherwise. ⁴And let this be for you the true obedience of the Lord God and my true obedience, for I know with certitude that it is true obedience. ⁵And love those who do those things to you ⁶and do not wish anything different from them, unless it is something the Lord God shall have given you. ⁷And love them in this and do not wish that they be better Christians. ⁸And let this be more than a hermitage for you.

⁹And if you have done this, I wish to know in this way if you love the Lord and me, His servant and yours: that there is not any brother in the world who has sinned—however much he could have sinned—who, after he has looked into your eyes, would ever depart without your mercy, if he is looking for mercy. ¹⁰And if he were not looking for mercy, you would ask him if he wants mercy. ¹¹And if he would sin a thousand times before your eyes, love him more than me so that you may draw him to the Lord; and always be merciful with brothers such as these. ¹²And you may announce this to the guardians, when you can, that, for your part, you are resolved to act in this way.^a

¹³During the Chapter of Pentecost, with the help of God and the advice of our brothers, we shall make one chapter such as this from all the chapters of the Rule that treat of mortal sin:^b

¹⁴If any one of the brothers, at the instigation of the enemy, shall have sinned mortally, let him be bound by obedience to have recourse to his guardian. ¹⁵Let all the brothers who know that he has sinned not bring shame upon him or slander him; let them, instead, show great mercy to him and keep the sin of their brother very secret because *those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do.* Mt 9:12 Mk 2:17 Lk ^{5:31} ¹⁶In a similar way let them be bound by obedience to send him to his custodian with a companion. ¹⁷And let that custodian provide for him with mercy as he would wish to be provided for were he in a similar position. Mt 7:12 Lk ^{6:31} ¹⁸If he falls into some venial sin, let him confess to his brother who is a

priest. ¹⁹If there is no priest there, let him confess to his brother until he has a priest who may canonically absolve him, ^{Jas 5:16} as it has been said. ²⁰And let them not have the power to impose any other penance on them except this: *Go and sin no more*. ^{Jn 8:11 c}

²¹May you keep this writing with you until Pentecost so that it may be better observed, when you will be with your brothers. ²²With the help of the Lord God, you will take care of these and everything else that is not clear in the Rule.

Surely, Francis acknowledges that the heart of a community member or a guardian may want to turn away from a sinner. Another's sin can be an impediment to one's own loving. Reacting with honest anger and condemnation to another's weakness can prevent one's own choice to be charitable.

Surely, Francis admonishes one who has harmed another to admit his or her behavior. He maintains, though, that the listener's mustering a loving attitude for a sinner is an obedient response to God. Offering mercy, whether it has been asked for or not, is the mark of a brother or sister of all, in Christ.

Surely, 'There, but for the grace of God, go I' is the attitude that allows that awareness of both the human reality and the divine invitation, for each person to accept and prosper. 'Brothers and sisters, while we have time, let us do good.'

As a new member of the Commission, curious to learn more about its workings, I was heartened to hear the enthusiasm for the movement toward "widening our tent." We spoke about the common gatherings of Franciscans of all orders that are happening in different parts of our country. Also, we heard about a Franciscan festival that occurs in Italy, gathering Franciscan hearted people to celebrate the gift of the Franciscan spirit.

COMMISSION OF CHARISM SERVICES

With Jesus in the Neighborhood

September always seems to me to be an "in-between month." We're in between summer and autumn; the days hold tenuously to the heat of months past, but the nights give chilly warning to what lies ahead. Schools and parishes are starting up their yearly schedules while our nation's advertising industry is reminding us end-of-the-year sales are already posted online and in the stores. The feast of St. Clare is already past, as are those of Dominic and Louis. (Where was I when that happened?) But Francis's feast yet lies ahead, along with the Stigmata and Elizabeth of Hungary — celebrations I'll be there for, if only I remember to appreciate them.

But, as we emotionally teeter between this way and that, I am at least comforted by the month's cycle of the daily gospels. September holds a full month's worth of the early chapters of St. Luke. In these chapters (roughly 4 through 9) Jesus is in his Galilean ministry, choosing his disciples, introducing himself to the neighborhood, and ministering to the great multitude.

In this part of the gospel Jesus lays out his significant Sermon on the Plain, with beatitudes for the poor and humble but also woes for those who refuse to take heed. His ethic of love and non-judgement are presented with simplicity and clarity.

- Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. (6:27)
- Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. (6:36)
- Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give, and gifts will be given to you, a good measure, packed together, shaken down and overflowing will be poured into your lap. For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you. (6:37-38)

 A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit. (6:43-44)

In these chapters we meet the men who will leave behind careers and businesses to follow this rabbi into the unknown. We are likewise introduced to the many women who accompany Jesus through the Galilean countryside who draw from his strength and provide for his needs, who seek his forgiveness and receive his healing. And we meet some of the family of Jesus, dealt with more neutrally in the text of this gospel than the treatment they receive from Mark. We would expect as much, at least, from the evangelist of the Annunciation.

We also hear from Jesus the Storyteller. Here are the stories Luke shares with the other Synoptic writers. He speaks of earthy things and homey things in simple language, not yet the more finely-crafted stories of the later chapters (the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan, etc.) And, as with the other Synoptic writers, Jesus marvelously provides food for the many.

October will introduce us to Jesus the Journeyer, and Jerusalem awaits, but for now we have the comfort of still being close to home. Let's take some time this September to enter fully into the Word in prayer and meditation. Let's take time in these days to drink in the enriching words of our brother Luke, and prepare for the journey ahead.

Migration and Human Trafficking

In 2014, several young teens travelled from their nation of birth to escape the extreme violence they witnessed in their country. After 3 months they arrived at their destination where they were picked up by border control and placed in a shelter. Although this was not ideal, they felt safe for the first time in over a

year. Nine months later, on an early December morning, some of these young boys were found in a trailer by police during an early morning raid at the Trillium chicken/egg farm in Marion County Ohio. When the police found them, the boys were actually not in the trailer itself but under the floor boards, sleeping on the ground.

Over a period of four months in 2014, during the time when there was a large influx of unaccompanied children from Central America coming into the United States, 13 unaccompanied refugee minors from Central America were mistakenly released by DHS to human traffickers posing as sponsors of the children. The children were forced to work on the egg farm where traffickers threatened to kill them if they left. This story illustrates that human trafficking may occur among refugees, migrants and internally displaced people (IDP) in any country.

The International Organization for Migration (IOM) interviewed refugees in Italy who had traveled along the Central Mediterranean Route connecting North Africa to Europe. They found that 76 percent of respondents answered positively to at least one of the indicators for trafficking.

In 2015, almost 96,000 unaccompanied children claimed asylum in Europe. At least 10,000 unaccompanied children have dropped off the radar of official agencies since arriving in Europe and many of them are believed to have fallen victim to trafficking. In early 2017, German authorities reported 4,700 children had been lost to officials while in Sweden up to 10 children a week are reported missing.

The IOM reported that in both 2015 and 2016, eighty percent of the four thousand plus women and children fleeing from Nigeria each of these years were trafficked. Human trafficking is always an exploitation of vulnerability and immigrants, migrants and refugees are among the most vulnerable populations. Most lack money, food or shelter at some time during their journey. They experience a lack of community, family, social structures and networks. The trauma of leaving their home and their experiences along the way may dispose them to be less self-protective and enable them to be easily coerced as victims of trafficking. The more heavily secure a border crossing, the greater need migrants feel to acquire the assistance of smugglers which often leads to trafficking.

Camps for refugees and internally displaced persons are prime targets for traffickers. The concentration of vulnerable, displaced people combined with a

lack of security, services, and oversight make them ideal locations for traffickers to operate. In long-standing camps, traffickers are able to build relationships with corrupt camp officials and establish trafficking rings. An estimated 580,000 Rohingya Muslims have crossed into Bangladesh (August-October 2017) and organized trafficking rings are embedded in refugee camps, looking for vulnerable people to traffic for both sex and labor.

What can we do? During the AFC this year participants had an opportunity to advocate for an increase in refugee resettlement in the United States. Please email, write or call your legislators and continue to advocate. Also, if you think someone may be trafficked report a tip to the Human Trafficking hotline at 1-888-373-7888.
